PURPOSE: For Monitoring Purposes

1. RECOMMENDATION

That the Commissioner considers the content of the report.

2. INTRODUCTION & BACKGROUND

Independent Custody Visiting is the system whereby volunteers attend police stations to check on the treatment of detainees and the conditions in which they are held and that their rights and entitlements are being observed. It offers protection to both detainees and the police and provides reassurance to the community at large. The responsibility for organising and overseeing the delivery of Independent Custody Visiting lies with the Commissioner in consultation with the Chief Constable. The OPCC is a member of the Independent Custody Visiting Association (ICVA), a national organisation which works with OPCCs and the Home Office in support of visiting schemes. Custody Staff work closely with the OPCC to consider ways of raising awareness of the Custody Visiting process. Custody and OPCC staff contribute to training sessions and meetings.

There are currently 8 visitors in Gwent. They visit both custody units – Newport and Ystrad Mynach on a weekly basis in pairs on an unannounced basis. We provide a rota and the visitors themselves decide what day and time to visit. The volunteers are vetted to a basic level and serve a three year term which can be renewed subject to a satisfactory informal interview.

A total of approximately 19,500 detainees are held in custody annually. During visits in the last year, 683 were in custody and 368 accepted visits. Others may have chosen not to accept or were asleep, drunk or in interview. Visitors complete reports which are sent to the OPCC and the Criminal Justice department.

There are no issues of major concern. Matters raised are generally minor estates matters which are managed via the OPCC and fed back to visitors. The visitors meet as a group around 3 times per year.

3. ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

We currently run a scheme which meets the basic legal requirements however consideration could be given to enhancing the scheme using good practice advice provided by ICVA. Setting of Key Performance Indicators would allow improved scrutiny of the scheme but would also require more time and resources.

The visitors have received copies of the recent HMIC/HMIP report on the Joint Inspection of Custody and will monitor progress of the action plan via their

regular meetings.

4. NEXT STEPS

We will be recruiting new visitors in coming months in order to ensure that the optimum number of visits are carried out without putting too onerous a workload on the visitors. We will be providing both induction training to the new visitors and refresher training to the existing visitors.

5. | FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Custody visitors are appointed on a voluntary basis and as such there is no facility for financial remuneration. However, all reasonable travelling expenses are reimbursed. Annual expenditure for the scheme is approximately £3,500 which includes the subscription to ICVA (£500), expenses and training costs.

6. PERSONNEL CONSIDERATIONS

The scheme is administrated within the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner.

7. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

The Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011 Part 3 Section 299 confirms the statutory requirement to run an ICV scheme under a Police and Crime Commissioner.

8. **EQUALITIES AND HUMAN RIGHTS CONSIDERATIONS**

This project/proposal has been considered against the general duty to promote equality, as stipulated under the Strategic Equality Plan and has been assessed not to discriminate against any particular group. Whilst due cognisance is given to the requirements of the Plan in the recruitment, training and operation of Custody Visiting, the over-riding consideration must be the health and safety of custody visitors whilst undertaking their role. Visitors sign a volunteer agreement agreeing to inform the OPCC to any changes to their wellbeing or circumstances which could affect their ability to carry out visits.

Consideration has been given to requirements of the Articles contained in the European Convention on Human Rights and the Human Rights Act 1998 in preparing this report. Human Rights matters and legislation are of vital importance when considering custody matters. ICVs have been trained in Human Rights implications and monitoring takes place via the OPCC.

9. RISK

The potential risk of not providing a scheme is two-fold. Firstly a breach of statutory duty, but more importantly the failure to ensure that detainees are afforded the opportunity to have the independent check on how the force operates within custody.

There is a requirement to publish details of the scheme.
